RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- 1. Contestants must be between the ages of 18 and 24 as of December 31, 2024.
- 2. Contestants must have lived within a 20 km radius of the town of Ilderton for at least 6 months prior to the Competition.
- 3. Previous winners of the Competition are not eligible.
- 4. Previous participants of the "C.N.E. Ambassador of the Fairs" Competition are not eligible.
- 5. Contestants will be judged on the basis of professionalism, community knowledge and involvement, as well as a speech and a personal interview including possible questions concerning the Ilderton Agricultural Fair.
- 6. Contestants will be expected to give a short speech at the time of judging.
- 7. An Ambassador and a Runner-up Ambassador will be chosen.
- 8. The winner will be required to represent the Ilderton Agricultural Society throughout the fair weekend, during the next year at various events (including the O.A.A.S. Convention in February), and to compete in the "C.N.E. Ambassador of the Fairs" Competition in August. The winner will reign until a new representative is chosen the following year.
- 9. Each Ambassador will be asked to act as a chaperone for the new Ambassador at the following year's fair.

Rules & Regulations

ATTENTION ALL EXHIBITORS: EVERYBODY PAYS

All persons entering the grounds must pay the admission fee. There will be no exceptions.

This applies to officials of the fair, employees, exhibitors, performers, concessionaires and fair visitors. Many years of experience at fairs in the United States and Canada with an "everyone pays" policy has proven to be reasonable and fair, and it has met with the co-operative approval of the fair-going public. Membership pass will be valid for one day of admission only.

- 1. \$7.00 constitutes membership and entitles the party to one admission ticket and the right to make entries. Youth entering in an Adult/Open Class MUST purchase a membership.
- 2. NEW Deadline for entering Homecraft, Youth and Commercial Grain exhibits online through Assist Expo is <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 24 at 11:59pm</u>. Entries will not be accepted after this deadline. This will allow time to print and organize exhibitor tags prior to exhibits being received Thursday, September 26, and Friday, September 27, 2024. We encourage you to enter categories you think you will be entering even if the item isn't quite finished because there are no exceptions to the Tuesday deadline. Tags will be available starting at 5pm Thursday, September 26, 2024.
- 3. Youth All youth exhibitors will be assigned a membership number and must fill in an entry form found on our website, www.ildertonfair.ca.
- 4. Contact the committee chairperson if further information is required.
- 5. All stock must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor and must have been so at least thirty days prior to the show. All farm produce must be the property of the exhibitor, grown in the present year and of his/her own farm or holding.
- 6. Exhibitors of purebred stock must produce pedigree, if requested to do so. This rule will be strictly enforced. All entries are to be owned and registered in the name of the exhibitor.
- 7. No single entry will be allowed to be exhibited for two different prizes, except in the case of specials or if stated otherwise.
- 8. Exhibitors will be entitled to only one entry, per class, per section, except in livestock classes.
- 9. Animals must not travel faster than a walk outside the show ring.
- 10. Owners of large animals including horses, cattle, sheep, swine and goats being exhibited must provide proof of a minimum of two million dollars liability insurance indicating the policy number and expiry date, when requested.
- 11. All exhibits in the Homecraft Departments must be owned and made within the previous twelve months by the exhibitor. At the Chairperson's discretion, sections with a large number of entries may be divided. Articles in each section must be grown/completed by exhibitor since the 2023 Ilderton Fair.
- 12. All class winners MUST pick up their prize winnings at the Fair Office in the Arena between 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Saturday and 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Prize money will not be mailed except to horse exhibitors.
- 13. All exhibits (except Photography and Art) to be received Thursday, September 26 between 5:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. and Friday, September 27 between 9:30 a.m. and 12:00 noon, to be ready for judging promptly at 12:30 p.m. The arena will be closed while judging is in progress.

 Photography and Art entries MUST be brought in Thursday, September 26 from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.
- 14. NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED FROM THE HALL OR GROUNDS BEFORE 4:30 P.M., Sunday, September 29, 2024. ANYONE NOT ABIDING BY THIS RULE WILL FORFEIT THEIR PRIZE MONEY. However, entries must be picked up by 5:00 P.M. on Sunday, September 29, 2024.
- 15. Due to Health Regulations, you may not sell your food exhibits while on the fairgrounds.
- 16. Judges have full power to place articles in their proper classes and to withhold prize money on account of inferiority.
- 17. Ties will be broken wherever possible. THE JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL.
- 18. All protests must be in writing and must state plainly the cause of the complaint. The sum of \$5.00 must accompany a protest. The protest must be in the hands of the Secretary or President by 6:00 p.m., Sunday, September 29, 2024.
- 19. The following year's membership will be deducted from all prize winnings of \$9.00 or more.
- 20. All prize money that is not collected by the end the fair will be donated back to the Ilderton Agricultural Society.
- 21. While directors take every possible precaution to secure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition, the owners of such articles take the risk of exhibiting.
- 22. The Ilderton Agricultural Society, its members, agents, employees, and volunteers shall not be liable for any loss of or damage to property belonging to an exhibitor or to a vendor however caused. The exhibitor or vendor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Ilderton Agricultural Society, its members, agents, employees, and volunteers for any claim or damage however caused, arising out of, or in consequence of, the use of the exhibition space allotted.
- 23. All outdoor and homecraft vendors are required to provide proof of at least \$ 2,000,000.00 liability insurance, including name of insurer and expiry date. This certificate must also have the Ilderton Agricultural Society named as additionally insured.
- 24. All inside concessions vendors are required to provide proof of at least \$ 1,000,000.00 liability insurance, including name of insurer and expiry date. This certificate must also have the Ilderton Agricultural Society named as additionally insured.
- 25. While the Officers and Directors of this Society will use every available means to prevent accidents in and about the grounds, it must be strictly understood that all persons entering the show grounds must personally assume all risk of accident or injury from any cause whatsoever.

- 2. Each entry is to consist of one selection only, be it a song, dance or recitation, etc. to a **maximum** of 3 minutes in duration.

- 3. For duet, trio or quartet entries submit only one form giving the names and addresses of all performers.
- 4. Competitors may not perform more than one number.
- Competitors 16 years of age and under will be admitted free to the Talent show.
- The adjudicator's decision is final on all matters relating to any adjudication.
- 7. A keyboard, 3 microphones and 3 monitors will be supplied. We will also supply a CD player and the means for an iPod or MP3 player to be plugged into the soundboard. Contestants are responsible for supplying any other instruments, accompaniment or background music and media.
- 8. Prizes are \$50.00, \$30.00, \$10.00 in each class and \$5.00 to each participant not placed in class prizes.

Although a professional sound system is supplied by MMC Productions, we recommend avoiding cassette taped music if possible as it tends to amplify into less than quality sound and this may impact a contestant's performance.

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

All rules of the Ilderton Agricultural Society apply. Exhibitors must purchase a 2024 Ilderton Agricultural Society Membership. Open to all market (finished) steers and heifers in Middlesex County and Ilderton 4-H Beef Club Projects. Entries will only be accepted through AssistExpo and must include proof of \$2,000,000 liability insurance when submitting entry (Insurance Company and Policy #). Entries must include Tag # and tag colour (it is the exhibitors responsibility to have a large dangle tag with number in the calf's ear). Entries will open on August 1st at 10:00 p.m. The show will be filled as entries are received and after the first 30 entries, there will be a waiting list. Animals are to be brought to Denfield Livestock Exchange on Friday, between 1:00 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to be weighed. There will be a 3% pencil shrinkage. All animals must be sold. A commission of 5% will be charged by the Ilderton Agricultural Society. Entries that are over 1400 lbs. will be sold at 1400 lbs. In the case of Ilderton 4-H animals, the animals will be sold, but will not become the property of buyer until Saturday at 5 p.m. All animals must have a CCIA tag. All animals are subject to a culling committee (ie. Stag, under finish, horns over 1 1/2 inches). All animals must be halter broken; any unruly animals will be left at Denfield Livestock Exchange. All animals must be 30 months of age or younger. There will be a designated clipping chute area. Animals must have a good halter when shipped to the buyer or a \$15.00 charge will be withheld from your cheque. This decision will be at the committee's discretion. Exhibitors of the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion animals are responsible for the care of their animals until 5 p.m. on Sunday. Judge and committee decision is final. The committee has the right to amend rules for the betterment of the show.
